<b>Gavin Newsom</b> (Party Preference: DEM)	1,913,663	56.3%
<b>Brian Dahle*</b> (Party Preference: REP)	572,505	16.8%

*\*Former Assembly Republican Leader and current State Senator Brian Dahle secured a spot on the top two and will be facing against Newsom in the general.*

*\*Incumbent Rob Bonta will face off against Nathan Hochman (R) as NPP candidate Anne Marie Schubert, current Sacramento DA was unable to break through to the top 2.*

*A typically safe Republican seat currently held by Senator Jim Nielsen (R – Red Bluff) will be heading into a Democrat-on-Democrat race in November. With 6 republicans on the ballot, the vote was split amongst GOP candidates not allowing any of them to advance to the general election.*
